

Federal Infrastructure Bill - Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)

Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)

- IIJA, the most recent 5-year federal highway reauthorization act (Fiscal Years 2022 through 2026), was passed by Congress in November 2021.
- Formula funds in FY 2022-2026 increased approximately \$1 billion each year than the funding in last year of previous highway authorization, Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act.
 - While a 21% increase in federal formula funding from FY 2021 to FY 2022, IIJA represents approximately a 6% increase in TxDOT's annual budget.







USDOT releases Equitable Transportation Community (ETC) Explorer with a transportation-specific lens for disadvantage



OVERVIEW: USDOT creates the first-of-its-kind transportation-specific tool, harnessing the latest census tract data across federally available data sources to provide users a centralized, easy-to-use platform that creates visibility into drivers of transportation disadvantage.

KEY FEATURES & DATA



Transportation-specific disadvantage index

Incorporates 40+ data elements across 5 categories of disadvantage: Transportation Insecurity, Health Vulnerability, Climate/Hazard Risk Component, Environmental Burden, Socioeconomic Vulnerability



Transportation Insecurity & Access Tool (TIAT)*


Visually displays the raw data for a select group of indicators related to **cost**, **access**, **and safety** at the state or national level, that reflect transportation insecurity.

Latest Census Tracts



Incorporates 2020 U.S. Census Tracts and data from sources including NOAA, USDOT, FEMA, EPA, Census Bureau, BIA, MRLC, DHS, CDC, DOI, and Esri.

Types of DOT Funding Programs



Discretionary Grant Funding Programs (\$196B)

USDOT administers competitive discretionary grant programs through its operating administrations (OAs) and OST. Each program office solicits applications and selects projects based on program eligibility, evaluation criteria, and Departmental or program priorities.

Formula Grant Funding Programs (\$446B)

Congress sets formulas for USDOT to apportion formula grant program funding. USDOT distributes these funds to States, territories, Federally-recognized tribal recipients, and transit agencies. The funds may be further distributed to localities at the State, tribal or agency discretion.

Loan Financing Programs (\$100B)

Credit assistance programs leverage Federal funds to attract private and other non-Federal co-investment for transportation projects. This can take the form of secured (direct) loans, loan guarantees, and lines of credit. The Build America Bureau manages USDOT's financing programs. The FHWA Center for Innovative Finance Support also houses helpful resources related to USDOT's financing options.

Public-Private Partnerships (P3s)

P3s involve collaboration between one or more government agencies and private sector companies to leverage public and private resources to develop and execute a project. This model allows for greater private participation in project delivery and can bring creativity, efficiency, and innovative solutions to address complex transportation issues.



TIFIA 49

DOT used its existing authority to implement changes to TIFIA that allows certain projects that advance climate goals, including joint development projects with housing components, to *borrow up to 49% of eligible project costs*.

TIFIA

Transportation Infrastructure Finance & Innovation Act

- Surface transportation and public infrastructure
- Finance up to 33%* of eligible project costs

RRIF

Railroad Rehabilitation & Improvement Financing

- Passenger rail, freight rail, commuter rail, and transit-oriented development (TOD)
- Finance up to 100%*
 of eligible project costs


Key Loan Features

- Long-term repayment period
 - Up to 35 years*
 - Can be deferred for five years following substantial completion
 - No pre-payment penalty
- Highly customizable to meet borrower needs
- Also offer loan guarantees and lines of credit

What Makes a Good Application?



- READ THE NOFO
- Read other NOFOs
- Technical capacity and partnerships
- Clear financial plan to deliver the project
- Narrative and data (ETC can help with this!)
- Webinars/DOT resources
- Stakeholder support
- Congressional support
- DO NOT WAIT UNTIL THE LAST MINUTE TO SUBMIT!!



Multimodal Project Discretionary Grant Opportunity (MPDG)



- Mega: \$1.8 billion of FY 2023 and FY 2024 funding for the National Infrastructure Project Assistance grants program, known as the "Mega" grants program.
- INFRA: Approximately \$3.1 billion in FY 2023 and FY 2024 funding to be made available for the Nationally Significant Multimodal Freight and Highways Projects grants program, known as "INFRA."
- Rural: \$650 million in FY 2023 and FY 2024 funding for the Rural Surface Transportation Grant program, known as "Rural."

Selection Criteria:

- **Project Outcomes:** Safety; State of Good Repair; Economic Impacts, Freight Movement, and Job Creation; Climate Change, Resiliency, and the Environment; Equity, Multimodal Options, and Quality of Life; Innovation.
- Economic Analysis (Benefit Cost Analysis)
- **Project Readiness Analysis:** Technical Assessment; Financial Completeness Assessment: Environmental Risk Assessment.

Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods (RCN)



The Office of the Secretary of Transportation (OST) has released a joint Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for the Reconnecting Communities Pilot (RCP) and Neighborhood Access and Equity (NAE) programs, which will combine two major discretionary grants into one NOFO. Together, this combined program will be known as the Reconnecting Communities and Neighborhoods (RCN) Program. While they remain separate programs for the purposes of award, the programs share many common characteristics, including:

- Prioritizing disadvantaged communities;
- Aiming to improve access to daily needs such as jobs, education, healthcare, food, and recreation;
- Fostering equitable development and restoration;
- Reconnecting communities by removing, retrofitting, or mitigating highways or other transportation facilities that create barriers to community connectivity, including to mobility, access, or economic development.

Under the combined RCN Program, USDOT will offer three grant types:

- Capital Construction (\$1.15B)
- Community Planning (\$185M)
- Regional Partnerships Challenge (\$450M)

Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant Program



The new Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant Program, created under President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, with \$5 billion in advanced appropriations over the next 5 years. The \$1.17 billion Fiscal Year 2023 application period closed July 10, 2023. It is a key program that supports the National Roadway Safety Strategy and funding supports local initiatives to prevent death and serious injury on roads and streets, commonly referred to as "Vision Zero" or "Toward Zero Deaths" Initiatives.

Eligible Applicants: Political Subdivisions of a State, Federally Recognized Tribal Governments, Metropolitan Planning Organizations, or Multijurisdictional Groups comprised of those entities.

Action Plan Grants

- Eligible Planning Activities: Develop or Complete a Comprehensive Safety Action Plan. Conduct supplemental action planning activities (in support of an existing Comprehensive Safety Action Plan).
- Developed to be accessible to all communities with a low barrier to entry; including three major criteria, safety impact, equity, and safety considerations.
- At least 40% of awards funds for action plan activities

Implementation Grants

- Eligible Planning Activities: Implement projects and strategies. Conduct planning and design. Conduct supplemental action planning activities (in support of an existing Comprehensive Safety Action Plan).
- Applicant must already have established Action Plan in place. Activities must be tied directly to projects and strategies identified in Action Plan.














How do I apply to the Thriving Communities Program?



- If your Organization is interested in applying to be a TCP-N or TCP-R funded Capacity Builder, apply via grants.gov by November 28, 2023
 - Find the NOFO on the <u>TCP website</u>, or search Opportunity Number DOT-TCP-FY23-01 in grants.gov
- If your COMMUNITY is interested in applying to receive in-kind technical assistance, planning, and capacity building support from selected Capacity Builders, submit a Letter of Interest through the TCP online webform by November 15, 2023




