Education and Research

<u>Build and Broaden 2.0: Enhancing Social, Behavioral and Economic Science Research and Capacity at Minority-Serving Institutions</u>

Project description: Build and Broaden 2.0 (B2 2.0) encourages research collaborations between scholars at minority-serving institutions (MSIs) and scholars in other institutions or organizations. Growing the science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) workforce is a national priority. National forecasts of the impending shortage of science and engineering skills and essential research workforce underscore a need to expand opportunities to participate in STEM research

Eligibility: See opportunity for more information.

Application Due date: Mar 05, 2021

YouthBuild

Project description: The YouthBuild model balances project-based academic learning and occupational skills training to prepare at-risk youth for career placement. The academic component assists youth who are often significantly behind in basic skill development in obtaining a high school diploma or state high school equivalency credential. The occupational skills training component prepares at-risk youth for apprenticeship and other career pathways and/or further education or training. It also supports the goal of increasing affordable housing within communities by teaching youth construction skills learned by building or significantly renovating homes for sale or rent to low-income families or transitional housing for homeless families or individuals.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants for these grants are public or private non-profit agencies. These organizations include rural, urban, or Native American agencies that have previously served disadvantaged youth in a YouthBuild or other similar program. These agencies or organizations may include, but are not limited to, the following:Community and faith-based organizations with IRS 501(c)(3) non-profit status; An entity carrying out activities under WIOA, such as a local workforce development board or one-stop career center partner program; Educational institutions, including a local school board, public school district, or community college;A community action agency; A state or local housing development agency; Any Indian and Native American entity eligible for grants under Sec. 166 of WIOA, including federally and other than federally-recognized Tribes, Native American non-profit organizations, and Native Hawaiian and Alaska Native organizations; A community development corporation; A state or local youth service conservation corps; andAny other public or private non-profit entity that is eligible to provide education or employment training under a federal program and can meet the required elements of the grant.

Field Initiated Projects Program: Minority-Serving Institution (MSI) - Development

Project description: The purpose of the Field Initiated (FI) Projects program is to develop methods, procedures, and rehabilitation technology that maximize the full inclusion and integration into society, employment, independent living, family support, and economic and social self-sufficiency of individuals with disabilities, especially individuals with the most severe disabilities. The purpose of this MSI-FI competition is to improve the capacity of minority entities to engage in disability and rehabilitation research and development activities.

Eligibility: Public and State controlled institutions of higher education, Private institutions of higher

education

Field Initiated Projects Program: Minority-Serving Institution (MSI) -Research

Project description: The purpose of the Field Initiated (FI) Projects program is to develop methods, procedures, and rehabilitation technology that maximize the full inclusion and integration into society, employment, independent living, family support, and economic and social self-sufficiency of individuals with disabilities, especially individuals with the most severe disabilities. In carrying out a research activity under a FI Projects research grant, a grantee must identify one or more hypotheses or research questions and, based on the hypotheses or research questions identified, perform an intensive, systematic study directed toward producing (1) new scientific knowledge, or (2) better understanding of the subject, problem studied, or body of knowledge.

Eligibility: Public and State controlled institutions of higher education, Private institutions of higher education

Mental Health Awareness Training

Project description: The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), Center for Mental Health Services (CMHS) is accepting applications for fiscal year (FY) 2021 Mental Health Awareness Training grants (Short Title: MHAT). The purpose of this program is to: (1) train individuals (e.g., school personnel, emergency first responders, law enforcement, veterans, armed services members and their families) to recognize the signs and symptoms of mental disorders, particularly serious mental illness (SMI) and/or serious emotional disturbance (SED); (2) establish linkages with school-and/or community-based mental health agencies to refer individuals with the signs or symptoms of mental illness to appropriate services; (3) train emergency services personnel, veterans, law enforcement, fire department personnel, and others to identify persons with a mental disorder and employ crisis deescalation techniques; and (4) educate individuals about resources that are available in the community for individuals with a mental disorder. It is expected that this program will prepare and train others on how to appropriately and safely respond to individuals with mental disorders, particularly individuals with SMI and/or SED.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are domestic public and private nonprofit entities.

Nurse Faculty Loan Program (NFLP)

Project description: The purpose of this program is to increase the number of qualified nursing faculty nationwide. NFLP seeks to accomplish this by providing funding to accredited schools of nursing to establish and operate a student loan fund and provide loans to students enrolled in advanced education nursing degree programs who are committed to becoming nurse faculty. In exchange for completion of up to four years of post-graduation full-time nurse faculty employment in an accredited school of nursing, the program authorizes cancelation of up to 85 percent of any such student loan (plus interest thereon). **Eligibility**: Eligible applicants are accredited schools of nursing with advanced education nursing programs.

Enhancement and Expansion of Treatment and Recovery Services for Adolescents, Transitional Aged Youth, and their Families

Project description: The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT) is accepting applications for fiscal year (FY) 2021 Enhancement and Expansion of Treatment and Recovery Services for Adolescents, Transitional Aged Youth, and their Families grant program (Short Title: Youth and Family TREE). The purpose of this program is to enhance and expand comprehensive treatment, early intervention, and recovery support services for adolescents (ages 12-18) and transitional aged youth (ages 16-25) with substance use disorders (SUD) and/or co-occurring substance use and mental disorders (COD), and their families/primary caregivers.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants are domestic public and private nonprofit entities.

Application Due date: Feb 08, 2021

Housing and Economic Development

Rural Energy for America Program Energy Audit & Renewable Energy Development Assistance Grants

Project description: This program assists rural small businesses and agricultural producers by

conducting and promoting energy audits and providing Renewable Energy Development Assistance (REDA).

Eligibility: State and local governments. Federally-recognized tribes. A land-grant college or university or other institutions of higher education. Rural electric cooperatives. Public power entities. An instrumentality of a state, tribal or local government.

Application Due date: February 1, 2021

FY 2020 Training and Technical Assistance to Improve Water Quality and Enable Small Public Water Systems to Provide Safe Drinking Water

Project description: The first National Priority Area is to provide training and technical assistance to small public water systems so that they can operate and maintain their systems to achieve and maintain compliance with the SDWA and to build their financial and managerial capacity to provide safe drinking water over the long term. The second National Priority Area is to provide training and technical assistance to small publicly-owned wastewater systems and communities served by onsite/decentralized wastewater systems to improve water quality and sustainable operations

Eligibility: Eligible applicants under this competition are nonprofit organizations, nonprofit private universities and colleges, and public institutions of higher education.

Application Due date: February 12, 2021

Arts and Culture

NEA Grants for Arts Projects

Project description: These grants support arts projects that use the arts to unite and heal in response to current events; celebrate our creativity and cultural heritage; invite mutual respect for differing beliefs and values; and enrich humanity.

Eligibility: County governments, State governments, Special district governments

Public and State controlled institutions of higher education, City or township governments Nonprofits having a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, Private institutions of higher education, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), Independent school districts

Application Due date: Feb 11, 2021
